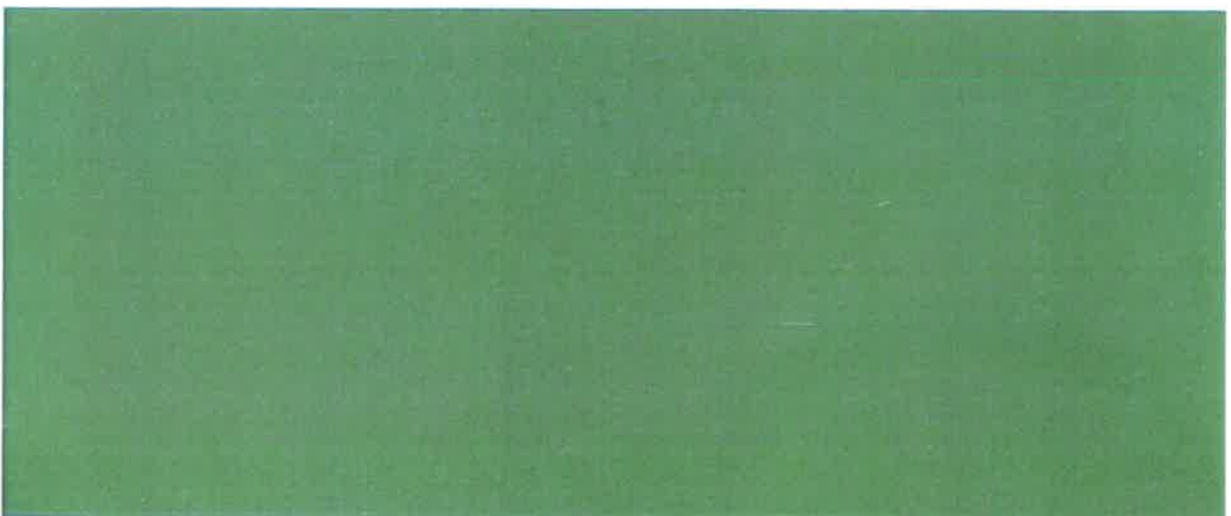

Martha Dillion - Ngati Raukawa

In 1938 she stopped collecting when she was burgled

Died 1963

Descendent of Martha Dillion, grand nephew is selling 17 pieces as part of a private sale

Has to be auctioned, cannot purchase pre auction

Auction to take place on Tuesday 26 March 2019

Must be a registered collector – Culture and heritage

17.5% surcharge

née Carkeek (1881-1963). A mere pounamu, traditional spatulate shape with swollen butt knob pierced by a large diameter off-centre hourglass hole. With an associated framed 'whakapapa' listing 11 owners, from Muriwai to Aporotanga and Te Awanui, inscribed with subscript:

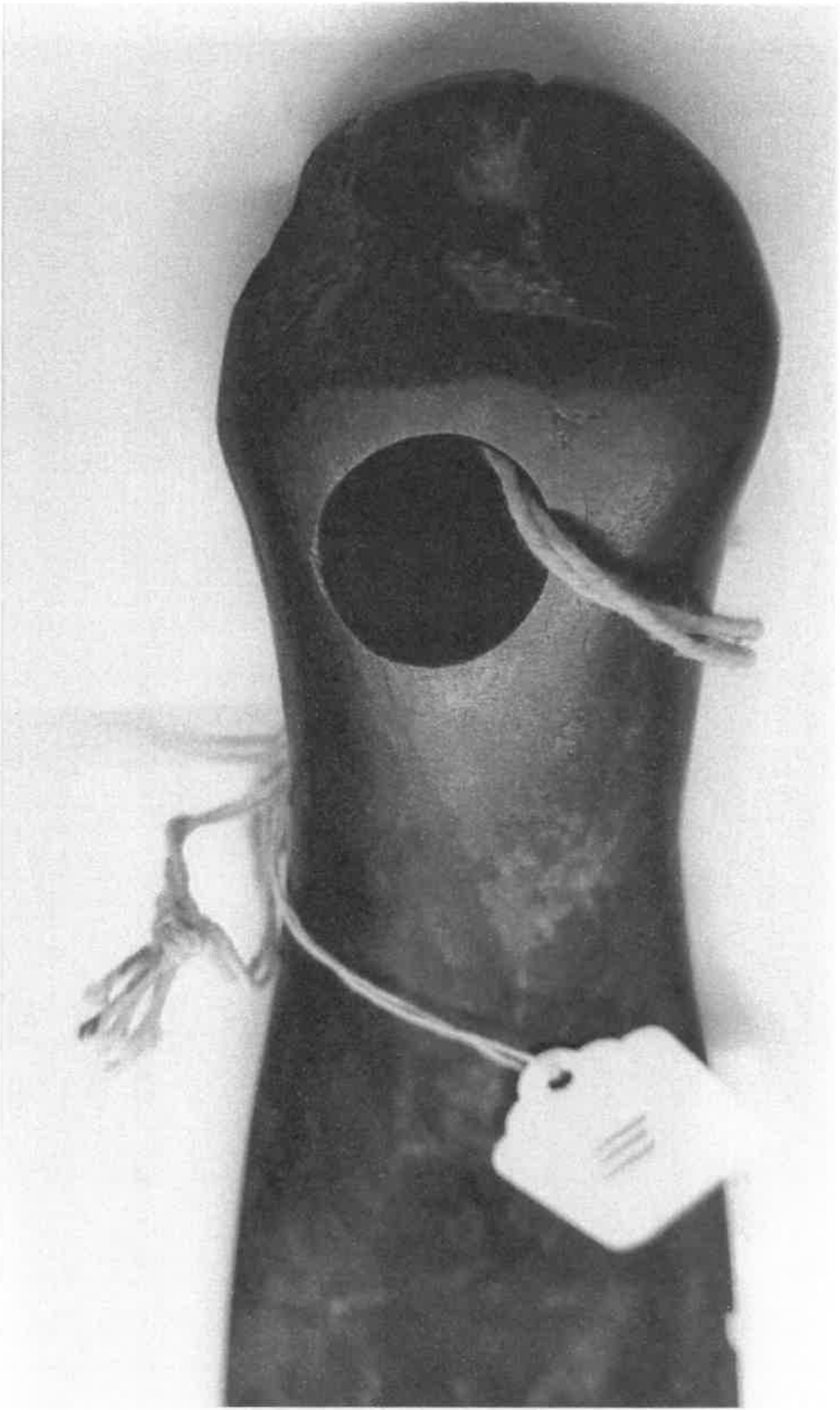
'Aporotanga paid it to Te Awanui as [crossed out: compens] utu for the great fight that took place between the Arawas & the Ngatiawas at Te Awateatua [possibly Te-Awa-o-te-Atua Pa or river in the Bay of Plenty]. The fight afterwards known as the Waikaukau.' Y20558. L.360mm

Estimate: \$5,000 - \$7,000

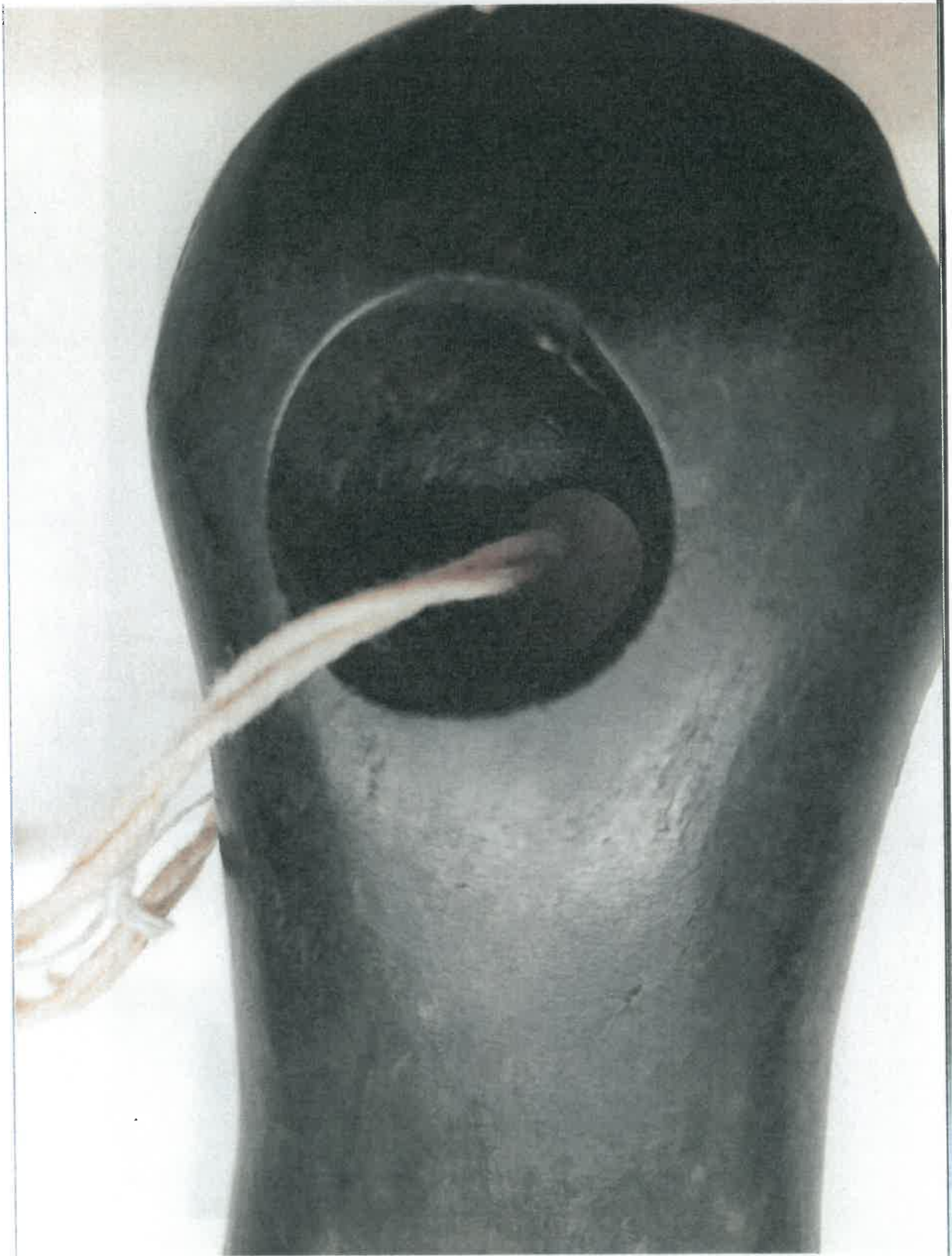
