My dear Sir,

I forward herewith for your information a letter I have just received from the Wairua Country about the Ngatiwharua lease. The Wairua continue to be a good deal excited about the leasing question.

The question of Mr. Kelly's lease is now left in abeyance till after the meeting in February; he is however he informs me putting a man to reside on freehold land of his in the Whakatare Valley near Ruatōki and is going in a day or two to drive over a large drove of cattle which are to run on his own and surrounding lands. He has of course a right to do so, but I fear complications will arise if any cattle should stray over the confiscated boundary. I have asked Mr. Kelly to endeavour to keep them on this side - and the Wairua understand that

that they are intended to run as the Coupercutid  
black and not on their land -

Tamaitowho and some of his people visited  
Opotiki at Christmas. He has considerable influence  
and I think his views are moderating, and  
that probably, he will after a time support the  
leasing party and perhaps allow roads in.

You will probably like to be informed that  
none of the Stanya a Mahaki who you ordered to  
return from Poverty Bay have yet arrived - Those  
who came over to attend the Land Court have  
returned overland -
