My dear Sir,

In accordance with your wishes I beg leave to forward you the following resume' of Apoliki Affairs.

I have just returned from inspecting the native schools in the Bay of Plenty and Lake Districts. This I am aware should have been done in December but the sitting of the Land Court prevented it. It was my intention to have proceeded to Ruaatana via Maungapowhatu immediately on my return, but I find that the Ruaatana meeting is put off. I am told that Herem te Putemi and Hataraka te Wataunui have gone to Napier on your invitation. I intend to visit Maungapowhatu as soon as I hear Hataraka is back to endeavour to settle a dispute between him and Tukikanahu about the orderly service.

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service - You are aware that Rukia Ropata arranged for an orderly service at Manapouriwhati the money to be paid to Renata Te Parewa - Since Renata died the money has been paid by me to Hekaraka, at first with the general approval of the natives, the Ngatiwhi however now state that Hekaraka applies the money to his own purposes and does not pay the orderlies properly and they wish Tutekauhau to receive it in future - I think what the Ngatiwhi want is for the whole of them who wish to act as orderly in turn - I have just had a visit from Te Pihau and Le Whereroa of Manapouriwhati (their first visit to Opotiki) - They came as far as Taumoko manuka to an Uhunga for Te Ariki and old chief of the Kauri lately dead, and then came on to see me about the orderly question -

I have just received word that the Wharanapaus have nearly finished their contract on the East Coast road - I hope to be able next week to go down with the Public Works officers to the East Cape to see the natives about the extension of the road -

I informed you by telegraph that Ni Kura his wife, Teipira, Pareka and another had visited Te Kaiti - They did not tell me they

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were going, although Te Mana tells me he was under the impression that they had done so -

I am informed however that Te Mana communicated with Mr. Clarke on the subject - Their avowed object was to take Mr. Mana's wife to visit her relatives -

I regret to have to inform you that the Stamps a Maohaki whom you ordered to return to Tonga have not yet done so -

I beg to thank you my thanks for the travelling allowance you have been good enough to grant me in reply to my application and to remain . Yours very respectfully
