Ratan Ratan has come
from Rualchana with Mr. Apurva
wife who left a few days after
you went. I am sending him
back to boy and boy out. The
Memorandum to whom he is nearly
related he will be accompanied by
a small party of Rualchana and
Murtipokto. These people deserve
great credit for the material they
take and the execution which they
give in the question of establishing
friendly relations with the Government.

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I am not very sanguine that
they will be successful. The mea-
sure by Waikanae has stirred them
up again and it is hard to get
them to hike to - please talk with
fighting is going on within their
borders. They say we held out -
left hands to - them but our
swords & sword, Samson & his
people desire meet - credit for
having crossed Waikanae & taken
the bay to the hills, but I think
that if they go further - unless
some in pursuit of the hills -
we will come to it, at least
for the present.

It is evident from Reuben's
statements that the Maori were
strongly in favour of peace a short
time since but now they are

paake, and my mt - people
for some time, however every thing
that we can do long, we will do.
I am sorry to say that I cannot
find out - any thing for certain
about the Maori - The Maori do
not appear to know any thing
about him.

Some men were brought in
to - Orotiki last week but of them
Waikanae the thing a Maori
hundred - called Whelton, I saw
some men out - in the woods
now and I hope some to have
the lot of the Waikanae in

the worst weather that I had
known in the Bay of Plenty and
it retards travelling very much.
